3. Why do you think the author chose to use the word **fierce** to describe the land?



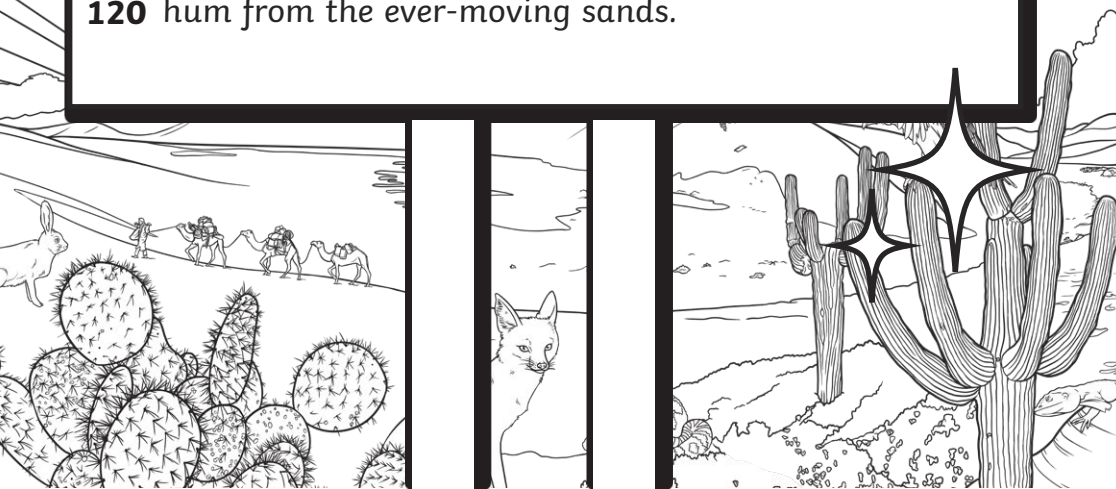

Answers



1. Which words or phrases in this text give us the impression that the atmosphere is strange and unpleasant?

beats down harshly; fierce and barren land; eerie



2. Look for an example of a simile in the text. How does this add meaning?

The simile 'like a snake' adds meaning because it helps the reader to visualise the shape of the dunes and how they look.



3. Why do you think the author chose to use the word **fierce** to describe the land?

Pupils' own responses, such as: I think the author used the word 'fierce' to describe the land because it is sizzling hot, parched and barren. The word 'fierce' emphasises that it's an unpleasant place.



4. What does the word **parched** tell us about the desert floor?

The word parched tells us that the desert floor is extremely dry.
